2023 Summer Camps

Deep Portage offers a wide variety of summer camps to suit almost any interest. Whether a child is interested in fishing, hunting, canoeing, or expanding their scientific horizons, we have a camp for them. Campers learn a lot, have fun, make new friends, and grow in their appreciation for all the Minnesota great outdoors has to offer.

Forkhorn I

Session 1: June 11-June 16 Session 2: June 18-June 23 Session 3: July 2-July 7 Session 4 (ALL GIRLS): August 6-August 11 \$500 or \$475 for MDHA members Ages 11-16

Successful completion of this camp earns students their MN DNR Firearms Safety Certificate. By learning in a cooperative classroom, doing hands-on activities outside, and plenty of practice at our rifle range, you can be assured that your camper will come away with a high level of firearms safety, responsible hunting practices, and wildlife ecology skills. Although they will be busy with firearms safety training, campers will also have plenty of time for recreational and outdoor skills classes such as canoeing, fishing, survival, orienteering, rock climbing, and much more.

Fishing Camp

July 30-August 2 \$350 Ages 10-14

Fishing camp provides a fun learning atmosphere where campers not only get to fish their hearts out, but also learn important lake limnology, water ecosystems, and fisheries management skills to make them better anglers and water stewards. Campers will be using Big Deep Lake, Bass Pond, Boy River, and Little Boy Lake as their fishing grounds and classroom. **Bring your fishing gear** and be prepared to catch a few big ones!

<u>Forkhorn II</u>

Session: July 9-July 14 \$500 or \$475 for MDHA members Ages 12-16

Prerequisite: MN DNR Firearms Safety Certificate

Students will be certified in the Minnesota Bowhunter Education Program (MBEP) as part of the camp; this certification is required in to purchase archery hunting tags in many states, provinces, or special designated archery hunting areas in MN. Sponsored by the Minnesota Deer Hunters Association, this advanced hunting camp takes students beyond the basic white-tailed deer hunting and offers higher level training in bow hunting such as shooting out of deer stands and walking a 3D archery target course. Additionally, they will learn advanced map and compass skills, high caliber rifle and muzzleloader training, and ethical hunting practices. Campers will go on a day long canoe trip down the Boy River, up and over beaver dams to the remote Little Boy Lake to fish and have a campsite lunch.

Upland Bird Camp

July 30-August 4 \$525 Ages 12-16

Upland Bird camp offers campers the opportunity to learn the basics of hunting upland game birds and improve their wing shooting skills. Classes cover:

- Upland bird biology from trained biologists
- Daily wing shooting instruction on our 10 station sporting clay pigeon course
- Dog training techniques
- Ethical hunting techniques
- Campers participate in an activity to learn how to respectfully gain permission on private lands

This is a great way to meet friends and learn about birds, dogs, and bird hunting. Each camper can expect to go about a case of shells by the end of camp on the shooting course.

Forkhorn III

Session: July 23-July 28 \$500 or \$475 for MDHA members Ages 12316

Prerequisite: MN DNR Firearms Safety Certificate

This improved Forkhorn 3 camp no longer has an Advanced Hunters Education certification. Instead, it will focus on advancing on the outdoor and conservation skills learned in Forkhorn 1 and Forkhorn 2. Campers will be doing advanced land navigation course with higher level survival techniques, rifle ammunition basics, muzzleloading, and shotgun wing shooting at our sporting clays course. We will be featuring special theme days at camp such as turkey, waterfowl, small game, and big game days where campers will learn more in depth information about the wildlife they can pursue and how to become more successful. Campers will go home with their own turkey and duck calls! This camp will also feature an overnight tent camping experience on DP property.

Izaak Walton League Family Camp

August 13-August 18 \$500 per individual, \$900 for duo, or \$1700 for group of 4 Ages 9 and up

Sponsored by the <u>Izaak Walton League of America</u>, this summer camp does a little bit of everything. This is a family friendly camp; all family members and friends are welcome.

Activities include:

- Fishing (fly fishing as well) Canoe trip up the Boy River Archery .22 caliber rifle shooting Climbing wall Wilderness survival
- Orienteering Wildlife ecosystems Renewable energy systems
 Bog walk TEAM challenges Campfire cookout dinner
 Arts and crafts Brick fired pizza dinner night

This camp emphasizes natural resource conservation and sustainability and is a terrific camp to meet new friends and hang out with family!

Upcoming Events

Gearing up for the Big Day in Cass County

Ready, set, bird! Planning is underway for the Annual Deep Portage Birding Day in Cass County. Each year, volunteers and staff members set out to record 100 or more bird species in a single day without leaving the county lines. The Cass County Big Day contributes to citizen science as our data is submitted to the Minnesota Ornithologists' Union and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology via eBird and will help with tracking global migration patterns. This year the event will begin at Deep Portage at sunrise on Saturday May 20, 2023 and will conclude that evening while listening for nocturnal bird songs before midnight.

This is also the second year in a row that the event is being held as a fundraiser to support Deep Portage. Last year the team tallied 128 species, generating a grand total of nearly \$3000! Highlights from last year included an extensive variety of warblers around Bass Pond, Ruddy Turnstones and a Sanderling on the beaches at Leech Lake, meadowlarks and magpies in southern Cass County, and an unbelievable showing of the woodcock sky dance at dusk.

Cass County has proven to be a formidable location for such a birding challenge, but we need YOUR help to make the day even more successful than last year! In the coming weeks, we will begin accepting pledge submissions from Deep Portage supporters. Examples of previous pledges include simple general contributions, a dollar amount per species, and/or a set dollar amount for accomplishing a goal during the event chosen by the donor. Nature in Spring

Spring Ephemerals by: John Roth (Educator)

Ready to spring into the new season? As February comes to an end, some people might begin planning their spring endeavors. Despite winter being undecided to end in March or May, there is one group of organisms ready, lying in wait, ready to pounce out of the ground! That would be our spring ephemerals. Spring ephemerals aren't the warblers first arriving from their winter grounds, nor the salamanders and frogs departing their muddy winter beds. They are the first flowers, woodland perennials which develop their aerial structures like the leaves, stems, and flowers, before any other plants. So why the rush to bloom so soon? Well, let's imagine where they live. Small little flowers in the woods would quickly get blocked by the sun from the larger trees and shrubs that will leaf out in the weeks to come. For ephemerals, it's all about a race to light before their larger neighbors catch up. Once they have bloomed, pollinated, and seeded, most parts of their above ground structures will soon wither and be left with their underground shoots, bulbs, and rhizomes. During their golden hour, these flowers bring the first colors of spring, peppering the forest floor with splashes of purple and blues from our Round-lobed Hepaticas and violets to sparkles of white from our Bloodroots, Trilliums, and Wood anemones. Flashes of yellow can be seen from the Large-flowered and Sessile bellwort. Let's not forget ones who are more subtle, huddling their maroon flowers close to the soil, the Canadian wild ginger. Once the snow melts, Deep Portage's trails are full of these wonderful little ephemerals that are enjoyed by the wildlife and those who come to visit. No matter where you go this spring, take the time to look to the earth and discover what colorful
